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#### **SUMMARY**

The Institute was established in 1975 as National Institute for Prosthetic and Orthotic Training (NIPOT), an adjunct unit of Artificial Limbs Manufacturing Corporation of India (ALIMCO), Kanpur to give a thruston community based rehabilitation and human resource development. It was made an Autonomous Institute under the Societies Registration Act, 1860 under the aegis of Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment in February 1984. Its name was changed from NIPOT to NIRTAR (1984) and subsequently to SVNIRTAR in (2004).

#### 1. Objectives:

The main objectives of the Institute are:

- Manpower Development- Long term, short term courses, training for rehabilitation personnel such as Doctors, Engineers, Prosthetists, Orthotists, Physiotherapists, Occupational Therapists, Multipurpose Rehabilitation Therapists and other personnel for the rehabilitation of the physically handicapped.
- Promotion, distribution and subsidize the manufacture of prototype designed aids and appliances and Development of models of service delivery programmes in the field of locomotor disability.
- Vocational training, placement and rehabilitation of the physically handicapped.
- Docume nt and disse minate information on disability and rehabilitation
- Research to conduct and coordinate research activities on biomedical engineering leading to the effective evaluation of the mobility aids for the orthopedically disabled persons or suitable surgical or medical procedures or development of new aids and appliances.
- Extension and Outreach Services.

#### 2. Manpower Training:

i. The Institute conducted the following courses during the periodare: 4½ years Degree courses for Bachelor of Physiotherapy (BPT) with a capacity of 62 students, Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (BOT) with a capacity of 62 students and Bachelor of Prosthetics and Orthotics (BPO) with a capacity of 46 students. Postgraduate Courses-2 years Master of Physiotherapy (MPT) with a capacity of 15 students, Master of Occupational Therapy (MOT) with capacity of 15 students, Master of Prosthetics and Orthotics (MPO) with a capacity of 10 students and 02 DNB (PMR) students.

#### ShortTerm Courses-

The Institute conducting Short Orientation Courses (SOC), Continuing Medical Education (CME) programmes, Continuing Rehabilitation Education (CRE) programmes, Continuing OT Education (COTE) programmes, Workshops, Seminars etc. to orient the officials in Government and Non-Governmental organizations and to update the knowledge of the Rehabilitation and allied professionals. During this year, 20 such courses were conducted and 830 participants were attended.

#### 3. Rehabilitation Service Departments:

\*The Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation has a 100-be ded Hospital for Medical Rehabilitation, which also provides clinical material for teaching and research. Patients with Locomotor/Orthopaedic disabilities due to various ailments such as Cerebral Palsy, Congenital deformities, Amputees, Stroke, Spinal Cord Injuries, Leprosy, Poliomyelitis etc. and Locomotor disabilities associated with hearing and speech disabilities are treated and rehabilitated. Reconstructive, Corrective and Rehabilitation surgeries are being performed regularly.

- The Department of Physiotherapy is one of the oldest physiotherapy departments in India. The Department of Physiotherapy incorporates Musculoskeletal Unit (Manual Therapy & Traction, Electro-therapy, and Heat Therapy & Actino-therapy), Paediatrics Unit, Neuro-rehabilitation unit, Stroke & brain injury Unit, Hydrotherapy unit and Research unit. The department runs Bachelor and Master Degree courses in Physiotherapy.
- The Department of Occupational Therapy has two major components i.e. Academic activities and Clinical activities. Academic activities include conducting two long-term courses (Undergraduate and Postgraduate) and several short-term programmes. Clinical activities include the assessment, planning and providing the Occupational Therapy services to various types of patients.
- The Department of Prosthetic & Orthotic is the oldest Department of the Institute and from which the Institute was incepted once. Prosthetics & Orthotic are the measure thrust area of locomotor rehabilitations and it continues proper time need research and development program for the development of technology towards benefit of PwDs.
- The Department of Psychology is a branch of treatment that deals with psycho-social behavior of patients which promotes adaptation, adjustment and personal development and also focuses on the intellectual, emotional, social and be havioral aspects of patients throughout the various stages of rehabilitation.

- Department of Social Work was created in the year 2012, recognizing the need and importance of Social work in rehabilitation of Persons with Disabilities in view of changed scenario and continued its efforts to provide social services, vocational counselling and guidance to make the PwDs economically independent.
- Department of Speech and Hearing was also created in the year 2012 and provided language rehabilitative services which includes assessment of speech and language impairment in cases associated with or without locomotor Divyang and giving speech therapy to them in the Institute.

#### 4. Rehabilitation aids and appliances:

Rehabilitation aids and appliances are provided to replace the lost limb, support, correct and prevent the deformity in week limbs leading to disability to help the PwDs to perform their daily activities. There are 3599 rehabilitation aids and appliances were fitted/provided during the year 2018-19.

#### 5. Extension and Outreach Services:

Institute continued to provide rehabilitation services (Physiotherapy & Occupational Therapy) through its 03 Sub-centres at Dhenkanal, Cuttack and Bhubane swar to provide rehabilitation services to PwDs.

To provide the rehabilitation services to the Persons with Disabilities in rural, tribal, remote, inaccessible and interior areas, the Institute has been conducting rehabilitation camps in collaboration with District Authorities and NGOs to provide aids and appliances. During the year in 16 Assessment/Distribution camps, 919 aids and appliances are distributed among 656 bene ficiaries. In 05 Surgical Camps, 147 surgeries were conducted during the year.

The Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for the Persons with Disabilities at Guwahati, Assam (As one of the five centres was established by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India) to provide comprehensive rehabilitation services and Human Resources Development in the region. Institute provides technical and manpower support to CRC.

The Composite Regional Centre, Rajnandgaon is an extension of the Swami Vivekanand National Institute for Rehabilitation, Training and Research (SVNIRTAR) Orissa. It was established on 25th June, 2016 to extend services that cater to multiple and diverse disabilities, under one roof and now it is fully-equipped and functional to provide rehabilitative and educational services to all types of disabilities, located at Old Hospital Campus Rajnandgaon.

SVNIRTAR satellite Centre, Balangir was started functioning from 15.08.2015 with old temporary building nearer to CDMO office, Balangir till 21.05.2018. The new building of SVNIRTAR satellite Centre, Balangir

inaugurated by Hon'ble Union Minister Dr. Thaawarchand Gehlot and Hon'ble Petroleum and Natural gas Minister Sri Dharmendra Pradhan on 21.05.2018 near Kendriya Vidyalaya, Balangir, Sastrinagar and as per the order of Department of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India the satellite Centre, Balangir is upgraded to Composite Regional Centre from 31.05.2018.

#### 6. Library and Information Centre:

The Institute carries out several activities on information handling and dissemination under Library, Information and Documentation Centre. The Institute's Central Library has a collection of 8,393 latest books and several reports, reprints etc. Hindi Library has a collection of 231 books for the use of Staff, PwDs and their caregivers. The Institute continued to provide information under the Right to Information Act implemented in October 2005. Online resources package subscribed for the Institute Library since 2016.

#### 7. Research, Development and Achievements:

35 research projects of different departments are completed. The staff and student of the Institute presented 33 scientific & technical papers and 16 articles published in Journals (07 in National Journal and 09 in International Journal).

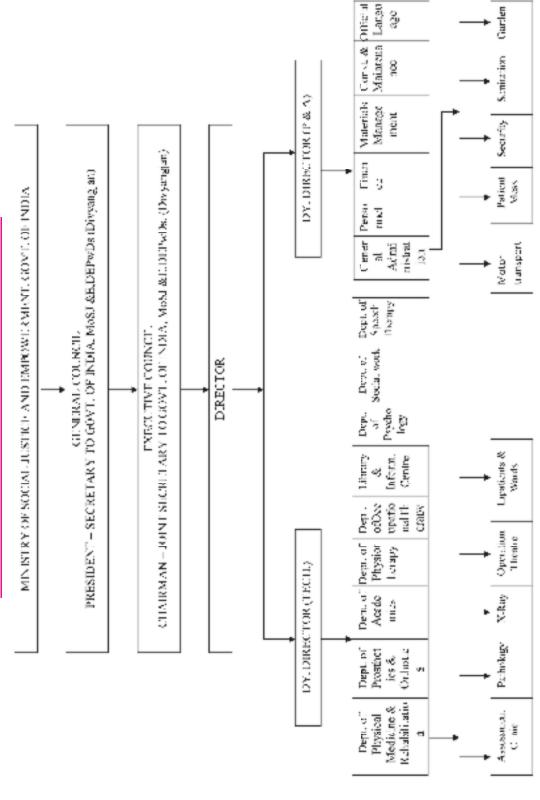

## CHAPTER 1 ABOUT THE INSTITUTE

#### 1.1 Introduction

- "Disability"-what is disability? Actually this term exits in frame of our mind. Let's change our attitude and change others. Make a commitment to end unfair and unfounded prejudices. Open minds and doors to people with disabilities. Repeatin speeches, writings and in films, three words: Disability, Equality, and Liberty. Listen to them, serve them, work with them, travel with them, shop with them. Our immediate physical environment should reflect our understanding and sensitivity towards the need of the disable people. Disability is a disadvantage for the individuals who endure it. But it is also a bigger disadvantage as well as a challenge for the larger society in any part of the world, which has so far not been able to offer an ideal platform in many parts of the globe to the Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan). The Country's disable dperson has increased by 22.4% between 2001 and 2011 census, which was 2.19 crore in 2001 rose in 2011 to 2.68 crore. The large mass of disable is kept away from their rights due to lack of awareness and willingness. The greatest challenge for the Government is the a chie vement of a ccessibility, inclusion and empowerment of PwDs. It is estimated that nearly 10% of the World population has some or the other type of disability. According to the 2011 census (20.3%) of the disabled are having locomotor disability followed by Hearing Impaired (18.9%) and nearly (5.6%) are mentally challenged. The disability population is also growing due to road traffic accident, industrialization, urbanization, natural calamities, ageing population etc. There have been continuous efforts by the Union and State Governments, Non-Governmental Organizations in prevention of the disability, creating awareness and providing medical and social rehabilitation for the Persons with Disabilities (Divyangian). The physically challenged are an integral part of society and they should not be subjected to any barriers such as environmental, attitudinal etc. They are not incapable, inadequate, pitiable, unhealthy, inferior and dependent on charity or unemployable. They are like any other human being, who has dignity, who wants to be independent and wants to participate equally in all socialactivities.
- 1.1.2 SSince last Forty four years, Swami Vivekanand National Institute of Rehabilitation Training and Research (SVNIRTAR) has been serving the Persons with Disabilities. It is located at Olatpur in Cuttack District (29 kms. away from Bhubaneswar and Cuttack) of Odisha. It was established in 1975 as National Institute for Prosthetic and Orthotic Training (NIPOT) an adjunct unit of Artificial Limbs Manufacturing Corporation of India (ALIMCO), Kanpur. NIPOT was

brought under the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment (the erstwhile Ministry of Welfare), Govt. of India on 22nd February 1984 to give a thrust to Community Based Rehabilitation and Human Resource Development. Since then it is an Autonomous Body under the administrative control of this Ministry. Its name was changed from NIPOT to NIRTAR in 1984 and subsequently to SVNIRTAR in the year 2004. It is one of the premier Institutes in the Country for providing comprehensive rehabilitation services to the Persons with Locomotor Disabilities.

#### 1.2 Aims and Objectives

#### 1.2.1 The main aims and objectives of the Institute are:

- ii. Manpower Development- Long term, short term courses, training for rehabilitation personnel such as Doctors, Engineers, Prosthetists, Orthotists, Physiotherapists, Occupational Therapists, Multipurpose Rehabilitation Therapists and other personnel for the rehabilitation of the physically handicapped.
- ii. Promotion, distribution and subsidize the manufacture of prototype designed aids and appliances.
- iii. Development of models of service delivery programmes in the field of locomotor disability.
- iv. Vocational training, placement and rehabilitation of the physically handicapped.
- v. Document and disseminate information on disability and rehabilitation in India and abroad.
- vi. Research To conduct and coordinate research activities on Bio-medical Engineering leading to the effective evaluation of the mobility aids for the orthopaedically disabled persons or suitable surgicalor medical procedures and for development of new aids and appliances.
- vii. Extension and Outreach Services.
- viii. Undertake any other action in the area of rehabilitation in India and abroad.
- 1.2.2 To a chieve these objectives the Institute has eleven major Departments/Sections viz. Administration, Accounts and Finance, Academics (HRD), Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation, Prosthetics & Orthotics, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Library & Information Centre, Psychology, Social Work and Speech & Hearing.

#### 1.3 Management

Two Councils, General Council (GC) and Executive Council (EC) comprising the representatives from Union and State Governments, renowned Social workers, Orthopaedics and Rehabilitation professionals, etc. govern the activities of the Institute. The Secretary to the Government of India, Ministry of

Social Justice and Empowerment (MoSJ&E), Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) is the President of General Council and the Joint Secretary (DEPwD) to the Government of India, MoSJ&E, and Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) is the Chairperson of Executive Council. The Director is the Member-Secretary of both the Councils and is Head of the Institute. The list of members of GC and EC are mentioned in Appendix - 'A' and Appendix 'B' respectively.

#### 1.4 Executive Council (EC) and General Council (GC) Meetings

As per Bye-law of the Institute, EC is to be conducted four times in a year and GC is to be held once in a year for framing the policies, monitoring the progress of activities and new initiatives etc. EC consists of 05 members and the Joint Secretary (DEPwD), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) is the Chairman. The GC consists of 08 members and the Secretary (DEPwD), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) is the President.

#### 1.5.8 Assistance to Disabled Persons (ADIP) Scheme:

i. The ADIP scheme was introduced in the year 1981 for the Persons with Disabilities and implemented by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India. The main objective of the scheme is to help the disable d persons and bring suitable, durable, scientifically manufactured, modern, light weight aids and appliances within their reach, which are essential for social, economical and vocational rehabilitation of the disabled persons. Details are available under Chapter-12, Assistance to Disabled Persons (ADIP) Scheme.

#### 1.5.9 Composite Regional Centre, Guwahati:

i. Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for Skill Deve lopment, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Guwahati is an initiative of the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India. The centre has been operating from its permanent campus located at Guwahati Medical College and Hospital Campus, Bhangagarh, Guwahati, Assam-781032. The Centre has been functioning since 19th March 2001 under the administrative control of Swami Vivekanand National Institute of Rehabilitation Training and Research, Odisha. The aim of CRC, Guwahati is to provide services to the PwDs and develop manpower in the field of disabilities in North Eastern Region (NER). It provides Comprehensive Rehabilitation Services at the Centre and through extended services (Identification, Assessment and Distribution camps) to the PwDs.

#### ii. Composite Regional Centre, Rajnandgaon:

CRC, Rajnandgaon, Chhattisgarh has been established and functioning under the administrative control of SVNIRTAR, Cuttack consisting with Eight departments i.e. Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Prosthetics & Orthotics, Clinical Psychology, Speech and Hearing, Vocational, Special Education & Visual Disability are functional, providing service to Person with Disabilities Since 25.06.2016. The basic aim of CRC, Rajnadgaonis to create resources and infrastructure required for developing services for persons with disabilities including human resource development and research. The Centre is for facilitating capacity at local levels as well rather than letting it centralize in urban areas. CRC, Rajnandgaon building was equipped with good infrastructure and all assessment and the rapeutic material to provide the best services to persons with disabilities. The team of professionals are providing their services in different areas such as rehabilitation medicine, clinical & rehabilitation, parental training, speech, hearing & communication, special education, training for persons with deaf and blindness, physiotherapy & occupational the rapy, early Intervention, prosthetics & orthotics, sensory integration, and community based rehabilitation.

#### iii. Composite Regional Centre, Balangir:

SVNIRTAR Sate llite Centre, Balangir has been established on 18.08.2015 at old CDMO building, Balangir for temporary basis. The Centre functioning with the Physiotherapy and Occupational therapy services, then the SVNIRTAR Satellite Centre upgraded to Composite Regional Centre for PwDs and it is sifted to newly constructed own building which was inaugurated by Shri. Thaawar Chand Gehlot Hon'ble Minister of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India and Shri Dharmendra Pradhan, Hon'ble Minister of Petroleum & Natural Gas, Govt. of India on 21.05.2018.

The CRC, Balangir is functioning with the departments of Physiotherapy, Occupational therapy, Speech & Hearing, Clinical Psychology and Prosthetic & Orthotic.

#### 1.5.10 Other Important Activities:

## 1. EFFECTS OF HIGHTONE POWER THERAPY ALONG WITH CONVENTIONAL EXERCISE IN OA KNEE

Outcome: Overall results of the study, both Group 1 and Group 2 showed improvement in pain and range of motion and function after four weeks of intervention. But there is no significant difference in between groups.

# 2. EFFECT OF BILATERAL REPETITIVE PROTRACTION IN ANTISPASTIC POSITION OF SUSPENDED UPPER EXTREMITY ON MOTOR PERFORMANCE AND SCAPULAR POSITION IN STROKE

Outcome: Overall results of the study showed significant improvement in active range of motion of the affected upper extremity for shoulder and elbowexcept wrist in experimental group only. Scapular spine distance improved in both the groups but more significantly in the experimental group. Fugl meyer assessment of upper extremity showed more significant improvement in experimental group post 4 weekof intervention. Bilateral repetitive protraction in antispastic position of suspended upper extremity is more effective in improving scapular position and upper extremity motor performance when given with conventional the rapeutic exercises of upper extremity than conventional therapeutic exercise alone for 4 weeks.

## 3. EFFECTS OF DEEP TISSUE MANIPULATION IN PERSONS WITH NECK PAIN

Outcome: Overall results of the study, both Group 1 and Group 2 showed improvement in pain and cervical range of motion after four weeks of intervention. However, Group 1 improved significantly to a greater extent than the Group 2. Conclusion: Deep tissue manipulation to periscapular and paraspinal muscles is found to be effective for the management of Neck pain.

## 4. EFFECTS OF DEEP SOFT TISSUE MANIPULATION IN LOW BACK PAIN PATIENTS

Outcome: Overall results of the study, both Group 1 and Group 2 showed improvement in pain and lumbar range of motion after four weeks of intervention. However, Group 2 improved significantly to a greater extent than the Group 1. Conclusion: Deep soft tissue manipulation of parascapular and paraspinal muscles is found to be effective for the management of lowback pain.

5. THE EFFECT OF CYCLIC STRETCHING WITH VARIABLE REST PERIOD BY USING LEG ABDUCTOR DEVICE TO IMPROVE THE FLEXIBILITY OF HIP ADDUCTORS & MEDIAL HAMSTRING MUSCLE IN CASE OF CHILDREN WITHSPASTIC DIPLEGIC CP.

Outcome: Cyclic stretching with rest in between stretch is effective. However, cyclic stretch for 5 minutes with rest between of different duration have similar effect one longation/extensibility of tissue.

6. THE EFFECT OF ELASTIC BAND ASSISTED GAIT TRAINING TO IMPROVE THE GAIT KINEMATICS IN STROKE SURVIVORS - A RANDOMIZED CONTROL TRIAL

Outcome: Overall results of this study showed that experiment group had significantly improved in terms of speed, cadence, stride length of paretic limb, gait profile score of nonparetic limb from pre to post test measurements. Both the groups had significantly improved in terms of stride length of non paretic limb from pre to post-test measurements; however the experiment group showed more improvement than the conventional group. Conclusion: Elastic band assisted gait training over the task oriented circuit interval gait training is found to be effective for the hemiple gic gait.

7. EPIDEMIOLOGY AND SOCIO-ECONOMIC CONSEQUENCES OF SPINAL CORD INJURY

Outcome: The incidence of spinal cordinjury higher in males, more reported in the rural areas, unemployed due to health reasons, mostly falls being the etiology with thoracic level of Injury and ASIA grade A, mostly coming under Upper-Lower Class in the Kuppuswamy Socioe conomic scale, mostly having no medical insurance, require dextra-financial support from family/friends, having no barrier-free environment at home and unable to afford the expenses following

spinal cord injury, with their social life adversely affected. Conclusion: The quality of life after spinal cord injury is compromised to a great extent.

# 8. EFFECT OF INTERFERENTIAL THERAPY AND KEGEL EXERCISE IN MANAGEMENT OF STRESS URINARY INCONTINENCE A COMPARATIVE STUDY

Outcome: The overall result of the study shows that there is significant improvement in both the groups. The experimental groups howed significantly better improvement in urinary incontinence questionnaire and modified oxford scale parameters than the control group, however transverse abdominis strength showed significant improvement with time for both the groups. Conclusion: Subjects having stress urinary incontinence in between age 20-60 years, because of weak pelvic floor and abdominal muscles was treated with kegel exercise, transverse abdominis strengthening, and interferential therapy was found to be effective.

## 9. BURDEN ON CAREGIVERS OF CHILDREN WITH CEREBRAL PALSY- A SURVEY REPORT

Outcome: After analyzing the data it was found that CP is more prevalent in the rural and among population with low SES. The caregivers face a lot of stress in taking care of the child and are affected financially, physically and psychosocially. Personal life and social life of the parents or caregivers of CPchildren has significant relation with their socio-economic status. Conclusion: The study showed the incidence of CP higher in males, more in the rural areas, with more number of cases being from the lower-middle and lower class families. Many care givers got assistance from their close family members and in-laws in taking care of their child. Mosthaven't opted for private the rapy except a few well to do families. More than one-fifth of them have a feeling of change in their own personality. Many don't know the social securities/schemes for CWDs. They are satisfied with the health facilities that are provided by the institutional care/ government set ups where they are undergoing treatment with a positive attitude towards a better future of their child; expecting support from the family for financial and social help, better care and treatment from the institution and financial aid/compensation for medical expenses/assistance for loan, from the government.

## 10. EFFECTS OF PLANTAR FASCIA RELEASE IN CHRONIC PLANTAR FASCIITIS PATIENTS

## 1. EFFECTIVENESS OF BACKWARD WALKING TRAINING ON WALKING ABILITY IN HEMIPLEGIC PATIENTS.

Outcome: In this study none of our subjects fell down during backward walking training. Backward walking training may be an appropriate training modality for improving asymmetric gait patterns. The study support that backward walking training significantly improves gait performance among stroke patients. In the study patient with hemiplegic were selected in two groups, experimental and control group. Following a backward walking training along with conventional treatment the patients in experimental group showed significantly better results than the control group.

# 2. EFFECT OF COGNITIVE ORIENTATION TO OCCUPATIONAL PERFORMANCE (CO-OP) APPROACH ON FUNCTIONAL PERFORMANCE OF CEREBRAL PALSY CHILDREN.

Outcome: The result indicate that there was significant improvement in functional performance when cognitive orientation to daily occupational performance approach was used as an adjunct to occupational therapy as compared to the occupational therapy was given alone.

So, the null hypothesis is rejected and alternative hypothesis is accepted. Thus cognitive practice is a promising area of research and cognitive orientation to daily occupational performance approach can be efficiently used in clinical practice for treating cerebral paky children.

## 3. IMPROVEMENT OF FUNCTIONAL SITTING IN SPINAL CORD INJURY THROUGH MODIFICATION OF WHEEL CHAIR SEATING SURFACE.

Date of Commencement : July 2017
Date of Completion : Aug 2018

Outcome: From the above study it can be concluded that modification in wheel chair sitting surface by customized made cushion on basis of individual pressure magnitude for functional sitting improvement will have a positive effect on individual with SCI, more beneficial during the intervention period.

4. TO COMPARE THE EFFECT OF KINESIO TAPING ADJUNCTIVELY WITH HAND EXERCISE ON IMPROVING HAND FUNCTION IN STAGE I AND STAGE II OF RHEUMATOID ARTHRITIS.

Date of Commencement : July 2017
Date of Completion : Aug 2018

Outcome: From the present study it can be concluded that kinesio taping can be used adjunctively with hand exercise to improve hand function in early active rheumatoid arthritis.

As there was no significant difference between the Grip Ability Test score of Group I and Group II, the null hypothesis is accepted and the alternate hypothesis is rejected.

5. TO COMPARE THE EFFECT OF MODIFIED CONSTRAINT INDUCED MOVEMENT THERAPY (MCIMT) AND BIMANUAL MIRROR THERAPY IN IMPROVEMENT OF HAND FUNCTION AND STRENGTH INUNILATERAL CEREBRAL PALSY.

Date of Commencement : July 2017

Date of Completion : Aug 2018

Outcome: The result indicate that the Modified Constraint Induced Movement Therapy (mCIMT) and bimanual mirror therapy; both are effective for improving upper extremity hand function and strength in children with Unilateral Cerebral Palsy. However, Modified Constraint Induced Movement Therapy (mCIMT) is effective in improving hand function whereas bimanual mirror therapy is more effective in improving ingrip strength.

6. A STUDY TO DEVELOP A QUESTIONNAIRE TO FIND OUT THE SPECIFIC CAUSATIVE FACTOR OF FEEDING DISORDER IN CHILDREN WITH ASD.

Date of Commencement : July 2017
Date of Completion : Aug 2018

Outcome: The purpose of the study was to develop a questionnaire which will help to find out the specific causative factor responsible for feeding problem in ASD children. Therefore, from the above study, it is concluded that autism can have an adverse effect on a child's ability to tolerate the sensory properties of food and that leads to food selectivity, food refusal and a version to oral care.

## 7. EFFECT OF KINESIOTAPING ON GAIT AND BALANCE IN SUBJECT OF STROKE WITH KNEE HYPEREXTENSION.

Date of Commencement : July 2017
Date of Completion : Aug 2018

Outcome: The present finding suggests that kinesio-tape showpromising results in improving the balance and gait in the stroke subjects with knee hyperextension. Thus, it is concluded that there is positive effect of kinesio-tape in balance and gait in stroke subjects with knee hyperextension.

# 8. TO STUDY THE EFFECT OF HOME BASED EXERCISE PROGRAM (HEP) VERSES INSTITUTION BASED OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY (IOT) IN IMPROVING HAND FUNCTIONIN POST OPERATIVE COLLES FRACTURE.

Date of Commencement : July 2017
Date of Completion : Aug 2018

Outcome: The result of this study found that there is difference on improvement of hand function of the subjects undergone for IOT & HEP. Hence the experimental hypothesis was rejected & null hypothesis was accepted. It is concluded that HEP & need based IOT both are not equally effective in improving hand function.

## 9. EFFECTS ON DUAL TASK TRAINING ALONG WITH VIRTUAL REALITY TRAINING ON BALANCE IN CHRONIC STROKE.

Date of Commencement : July 2017
Date of Completion : Aug 2018

Outcome: The dual-task training paradigm proposed in this study could effectively promote the ability to maintain optimal function on balance and cognitive tasks under challenging 'reallife' circumstances without compromising compliance to the practice schedule.

# 10. EFFECT OF TACTILE STIMULATION & VESTIBULAR STIMULATION ON IMPROVEMENT OF DEXTERITY & MANUAL ABILITY OF HAND IN HEMIPLEGIC CEREBRAL PALSY -A COMPARATIVE STUDY.

Date of Commencement : July 2017
Date of Completion : Aug 2018

Outcome: The result of this study found that there is difference on improvement of hand dexterity & manual ability of the children undergone for tactile stimulation & vestibular stimulation. Hence the null hypothesis was rejected & experimental hypothesis was accepted. It is concluded that tactile stimulation is more effective in improvement of dexterity & manual ability of hand in hemiple gic cerebral palsy.

## 11. EFFECTS OF COGNITIVE TRAINING ON GAIT PARAMETER WHILE TALKING DURING WALKING AMONG STROKE SURVIVORS.

Date of Commencement : July 2017
Date of Completion : Aug 2018

Outcome: From this study it is concluded that there is positive effect of cognitive training to improve gait parameter and balance which was generally impaired after stroke among stroke survivors. Hence these findings should be used in caution when treating the patient with stroke with gait and balance impairment.

# 12. COMPARISON BETWEEN FUNCTIONAL ELECTRICAL STIMULATION AND VISUAL AUGMENTED FEEDBACK TRAINING IN POST STROKE SURVIVORS FOR IMPROVING WRIST EXTENSION.

Outcome: From the obtained results of the study it is seen that the stroke patients improved in their FMAscores for the wrist components on both the groups but there was no significant difference between the groups so null hypothesis was accepted and experimental hypothesis was rejected. It is concluded that there is no significant difference in improving wrist extension between the functional electrical stimulation and visual augmented feedbackgroups.

#### 13. TEST OF IN HAND MANIPULATION SKILLS- TOOL REVISION.

Outcome: IHM is considered an essential component of the fine motor skills necessary to manipulate tools and objects and to master the world. Specific IHM activities are frequently included in occupational therapy intervention sessions for children with fine motor difficulties (Case-Smith, 2000) (11). The TIMS-R1 is an assessment of IHM that examines simple shift, complex shift, palm to finger, finger to palm translation, simple rotation, complex rotation with stabilization and without stabilization. No previous study has explored about the time required to complete each items of the TIMS and its reliability.

# 14. EFFECT OF TACTILE AND VESTIBULAR STIMULATION ON STEREOTYPICAL AND REPETITIVE BEHAVIOR IN AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDER CHILDREN: A COMPARATIVE STUDY.

Outcome: From the data analysis & result of the present study it had been found that sensory based interventions along with sensory integrative interventions &

Sensory integration intervention both was effective on reducing stereotyped & repetitive behavior in children with autism spectrum disorder yet there is no significant changes between sensory based interventions along with sensory integration interventions and sensory integration intervention alone which suggested that the experimental hypothesis had been rejected null hypothesis had been accepted. However the mean difference score of group-1 shows more as compare to the mean difference score in group-2 which is accepted by subjective reply by the parents of group1.

Duration of study: 2017-18

Outcome: Improving the quality of life of people with disabilities is a difficult and challenging task. World Health Organization estimates that 10% of the world's population has some kind of disability, and around 80% of the disabled population resides in rural areas. Improved training and skill development has to be a critical part of the employment strategy. Employment is often seen as an important step towards the rehabilitation and empowerment of person with disability, because it provides a sense of belonging, importance and independence. However, persons with disabilities often face many barriers when seeking employment and this is particularly in rural areas. Despite Government pledges to ensure equality of opportunity for people with disabilities through different skill development training programmes for employment but till now it is not been accessible to most of rural youths.

2. "WOMEN WITHDIS ABILITY"- ACCESS TO SOCIAL & JUDICIAL SUPPORT - A STUDY AT SVNIRTAR".

Duration: 2018 -19

Outcome: Girls and women of all ages with any form of disability are generally among the more vulnerable and marginalized of society. Less than five percent of girl children and Women with disabilities have access to education and training. Girls and young women face significant barriers to participating in social life and development. When women with disabilities work, they often experience unequal hiring and promotion standards, unequal access to training

and retraining, unequal access to credit and other productive resources, unequal pay for equal work and occupational segregation, and they rarely participate in economic decision making. Women with disabilities are particularly vulnerable and faced gender discrimination, violence, poverty, armed conflict, dislocation and other forms of social deprivation. Women with disabilities are among the most hidden and neglected of all displaced people, excluded from or unable to access most aid programs because of physical and social barriers or because of negative attitudes and biases. Definitely there is need of Social and Judicial support to this vulnerable group to uplift these women with disability.

## 3. "ISSUES AND CHALLENGES OF PERSONS WITHSPINAL CORD INJURY" - A STUDY AT SVNIRTAR.

Duration: 2018 -19

Outcome: In India, the situation is quite different from that of developed nations. Majority of the Indian population is in rural area which lacks the basic necessity and safety precautions such as lack of fencing to the wells, roof, and staircase and has poorly built/substandard homes (mud homes), Therefore, people are at a greater risk of having spinal injury either due to fall from height or fall of a heavy object. Other cause is road traffic accidents which are increasing due to lack of strict implementation in smaller cities and villages and also the lack of awareness regarding the traffic rules. According to the WHO, the incidence of this disease is on the rise in developing countries like India and road traffic accidents will become the third most disabling condition by 2020. Trauma care services in India are inits initial stage or evolving, and there is inconsistency in their distribution. There is a lack of coordination between the trauma care facilities and ambulance services.

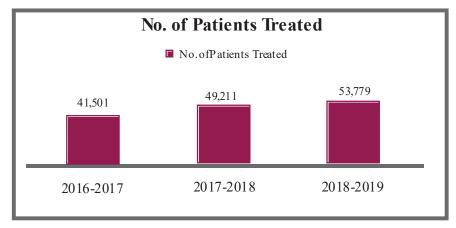

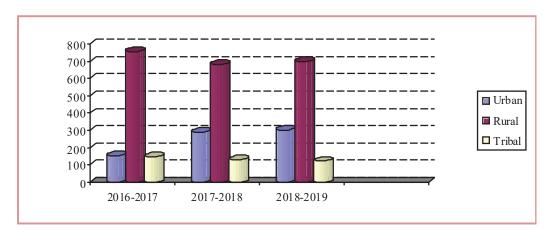

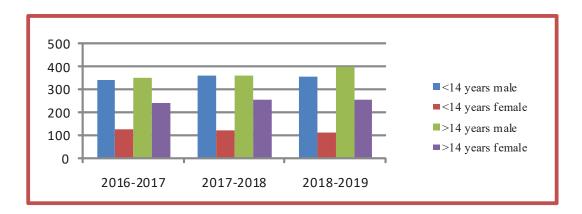

The Department of Physiotherapy incorporates Musculoske letal Unit (Manual Therapy & Traction, Electrotherapy, Heat Therapy & Actino-therapy), Paediatrics Unit, Neurorehabilitation unit, Stroke & brain injury Unit, Hydrotherapy unit and Research unit. The department runs Bachelor and Master Degree courses in Physiotherapy. The department is research intensive and is committed to research-informed teaching. Faculty and Staff are committed to exemplary professional behavior, collaboration and support.

The following **new electrotherapy equipments** have been introduced for betterhealth care delivery and research purposes:

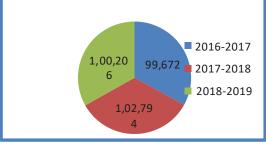
- Deep Oscillation Therapy: DEEP OSCILLATION THERAPY is a unique, internationally patented treatment method. Its special structure allows to create biologically effective oscillations in the treated tissue using electrostatic attraction and friction. In contrast to other therapies, these oscillations have a gentle and deep-acting effect on all tissue components (skin, connective tissue, subcutaneous fat, muscles, blood and lymph vessels). 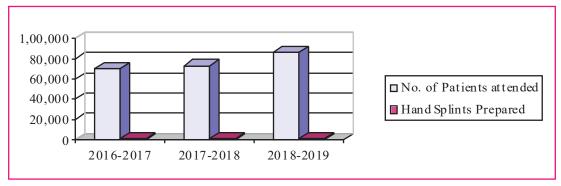

#### **CHAPTER 8**

## DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WORK

#### 8.1 Introduction

The concept of Social Workemerged during II World War and recognized as a profession. Social work as a professional service under governmental and non-governmental auspices, potentially available to every member of the community irrespective of his means, to assist him in achieving his full potentialities for productive and satisfying living. Social work is a systematic method of providing for the support and/or rehabilitation of economically dependent groups, e.g., the handicapped, the sick, the unemployed, the aged, the mentally ill, widows, the dependent children etc.

Department of Social Work was created in the year 2012, recognizing the need and importance of Social work in rehabilitation of Persons with Disabilities in view of changed scenario. In order to empower Persons with Disabilities and to give them their rights by promoting their integration into the community. Previously the socioeconomic rehabilitation services to PwDs and academic activities was done under physical medicine and rehabilitation department since 1989. The Social Work department aims at best practices in rehabilitation of PwDs through Education, Skill training, Job placement, Research, Publication and Extension services i.e., to strengthen the Socio-Economic empowerment service activities like Skill development training; to encourage Self-Employment and Entrepreneurship development among PwDs; to provide placementservices to Persons with Disabilities for enhancing their livelihood earnings; to develop Human Resource in the field of social work and Vocational Rehabilitation and to conduct Research activities in the field blended with a right based approach.

- Creating Public awareness, education, training & orientation at various operational levels, conferences & workshops etc.

- Productions/Publication of awareness kits, materials, posters, leaflets, booklets & Literatures, TV spots.
- Liaisoning with NGOs/GOs for implementation of programmes/schemes for the total rehabilitation of the disabled persons i.e. for education, Vocational Training, self employment and placement, referral & extension services.
- Dance, Music, Sports & Cultural activities and Competition for PwDs.

### 8.4.2 Vocational Rehabilitation Services:

- Acting as **Nodal officer of NHFDC** for Skill Training Programme to promote Skill Development training for PwDs.
- Vocational assessment, career & training guidance to the disabled persons.
- Voca tional Training Centre for Skill Development Training Programmes for PwDs.
- Initiating efforts and Conducting Skill training for PwDs at the institute and different districts of Odisha through' NGOs to empower the PwDs through improved skills, knowledge for gainful employment and decent living.
- Planning, preparing Project Proposal, EOI, MOU, developing strategies for Skill Development Training, Self-employment and placement of PwDs
- Arrange ment of J ob Place ment(Self Employment/ Wage Employment) for PwDs
- Distribution of Self Employment Kit to Skilled PwDs
- Orientation to officials of NGOs regarding conducting Skill Development Training for PwDs.
- Monitoring & Inspection of Skill training programs conducted by NGOs.
- Preparing Syllabus, Formats, Certificates and all correspondence & administrative approval regarding skill training.
- Providing stipe nd to PwDs.
- Supervising staff and training instructors for maintaining records, keeping stocks of vocational training materials, machines, equipments & products made by the PwD trainees at VTC of SVNIRTAR
- Financial assistance/loan for Self employment & Treatment (Guidance)
- Linkages for vocational services including training, self employment, placement, promotion of SHGs of PwDs etc.

# 8.4.3 Skill Development Training:

Department of Social Work is conducting Skill Development Training Programmes for PwDs at SVNI RTAR and in different districts of Odisha in

different trades to make them economically self sufficient and to lead a normal life in society. Afresh Proposal was submitted to Ministry for release of Grant of Rs.5, 65,500/- under SIPDA scheme for skill development training to 80 nos. of PwDs for the year against total amount of Rs.122 lakh for 540 PwDs.

### At Vocational Training Centre, SVNIRTAR

Vocational Training Centre (VTC), Department of Social Work is functioning for imparting Skill Development Training to the disabled persons from different corner of Odisha and other States of India in different trades. Presently skill training in "Appliqué & Embroidery work", "Screen Printing", Phenyl, Blue, Liquid Dish Wash and Candle making trainings are being given to the PwDs. The centre helps the PwDs to acquire vocationals kills so as to enable them to earn their livelihood. 104 nos. of PwDs from 19 districts of Odisha and from two other States Andhra Pradesh & Madhya Pradesh have been imparted skill training in different trades. Training in many new trades including Mobile Repairing, Beauty Therapist, House Keeping Attendant, IT and Apparel and are likely to become operational shortly under SIPDA Scheme.

### At Different Districts of Odisha through ETPs

As per directives of MoS&E, Govt. of India, invited EOI from selected ETPs for imparting Skill Training programmes for PwDs at different districts of Odisha for their socio - economic up - liftment under Grant in Aid of SIPDA.

# 8.4.4 Placement & Employment Services

- i. After successful completion of Skill training in different trades such as Mobile Repairing, IT, Computer Application, Applique & Embroidery Work, Screen Printing, Paper Plate Making, Tailoring, Motor Winding, Phenyland Fancy Bag Making 45 nos. of the PwDs have been placed in Self employment and Wage employment to earn their livelihood during 2018-19.
- ii. SVNIRTAR has been notified by Govt. of India as **Special Employment Exchange** to recommend the names of eligible persons with disabilities for job placements in Public Sector undertakings, Govt. offices and Private organisations for Group A, B, C & D categories of posts.

#### 8.4.5 Distribution of "SELF - EMPL OYMENT KIT"

After successful completion of skill development training programmes of PwDs, Self Employment kits are distributed to skilled PwDs every year for starting their own self employment venture to make them economically independent and self reliant. In 2018 - 19 year, 20 numbers of the Skilled persons with disabilities from different districts of Odisha who have trained in different vocational trainings like Motor Winding, IT/Computer Application, Mobile Repairing, Screen Printing, Applique & Embroidery work,

Tailoring, Candle making, Spices making and Paper Plate making etc, were being distributed self employment kits such as - Motor W inding kit, Laptop, Mobile Repairing Kit, Motorized Sewing Machine with Leg operated and Hand operated facility, Screen Printing Kit, Paper/Leaf Plate Making Machine and Candle Making Kits etc, at Department of Social work, SVNIRTAR.

- Distributed 11 Self Employment kits to skilled PwDs i.e., 10 nos. of Motor Winding Kit and 01 no. of Screen Printing kit who have been skilled in "Motor Winding" and "Screen Printing" by the Hon'ble Union Minister Sj. Thaa war Chand Gehlot, MoSJ&E and Sj. Dharmendra Pradhan, MoP&NG and Skill Training & Entre preneurship, Government of India during Inauguration of Satellite Centre, Bolangir on 21st May 2018.
- Dis tributed six Self Employment Kits Laptop, Motorized Sewing Machine and Screen Printing Kit to PwDs who have already been skilled in "Advance IT", "Applique & Embroidery" and "Screen Printing" training by the Secretary Smt. Shakuntala D. Gamlin and Joint Secretary Smt. Dolly Chakrabarty of Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India for earning their livelihood on the occasion of Laying Foundation Stone of Construction of Vocational Training Centre and CAD CAM Laboratory at SVNIRTAR on 29.9.2018.
- Distributed Self Employment kits to three PwDs (SC & ST) at the department i.e, one Screen Printing kit, one Motorised Se wing Machine and one Candle Making Kit who have been skilled in "Screen Printing" and "Applique & Embroidery Work" and in Candle making for self employment for earning their livelihood.

#### 8.4.6 Awarded Certificates:

56nos of Skilled Persons with Disabilities have been awarded certificates after successful completion of skill training in different trades.

# 8.5 Dolls' House & Art therapy, at Department of Social Work:

Doll's House is providing recreation through games, play therapy as well as art therapy to the small kids of Cerebral Palsy, Autism and other Locomotor Disable d children. It gives adjustment training, creates motivation to the children to cooperate in their treatment and exercises as well as helps to develop their mental and physical conditions and creative abilities.

# 8.6 Exhibition cum Sale of Products made by PwDs during Skill Training Programmes

On the Eve of Diwali and on the occasion of International Day of Persons with Disability an Exhibition Cum Sale of products prepared by PwD trainees during Skill Development Training at Vocational Training Centre, was organized by the Department of Social Work at SVNIRTAR on 5th, 6th

November 2018 & 3rd December 2018. The products include Handicraft works like Applique & Embroidery works, Fancy bags, Bed Covers, Cushion Cover, Wallhangings, Light stands and many other fancy articles, Screen Printing products like Greeting Cards, Show pieces and Phenyl, Fancy Candle, Washing Blue, Liquid Dish Washetc,. Exhibition and sale was started for all from 11 AM followed by inauguration of the event by the Director of the Institute. The products made by PwDs were highly appreciated by all and sold among staff, Students, patients and general public.

#### DEPARTMENT OF SPEECH AND HEARING

#### 9.1 Introduction

Speech and language rehabilitative services includes assessment of speech and language impairment in cases associated with or without locomotor Divyang and giving speech therapy to them in the Institute. Audiological services include assessment of hearing in hearing Divyangjans in the Institute and at outreach camps as well as distribution of hearing aids to the beneficiaries in the Institute and atcamps.

#### 9.3 Service Activities

9.3.1 Hearing evaluation of hearing Divyangjans is being carried out at the Department and at Divyang identification camps. Hearing aids are provided to the hearing Divyangjans after assessment. The hearing Divyangjans are provided counseling for proper utilization, care and maintenance of the hearing aids.

The assessment of speech and language is being carried out for Divyangjans with and without locomotor disabilities such as Cerebral Palsy, Traumatic Brain Injury, Hearing Impaired, Hemiplegic, ADHD, Autistic, Cleft lip and palate, stammering, misarticulation and delayed developmental milestones. Therapeutic services are provided based on assessment at the Department. Divyangjans having problem in swallowing and voice production are also being provided therapy after assessment at the department. Parents of cerebral palsied children are also provided training for feeding problems. Speech and hearing services in far-flung areas are also provided by organizing camps through the outreach and extension services of the institute.

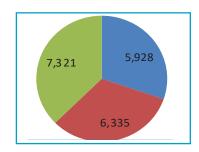
#### 9.3.2 Academic Activities:

#### 10.1 Introduction

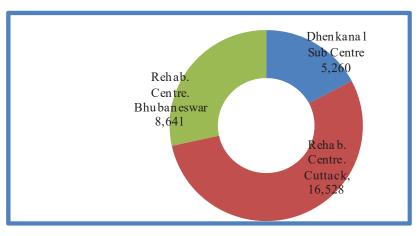
The Persons with Disabilities from rural, tribal and other interior areas come across lot of difficulties in obtaining rehabilitation services. In order to overcome these difficulties, the Institute has three Sub-Centers at Bhubaneswar, Cuttack and Dhenkanalin Odisha to provide Rehabilitation Services in the rural/tribal areas and conducts rehabilitation camps at various states to provide rehabilitation aids and appliances at the door step of the Persons with Disabilities. There is no staff designated for these activities. The staffs of various Departments are deputed for providing extension and outreachservices.

- 10.2.1 Institute continued to provide rehabilitation services (Physiotherapy & Occupational Therapy) through its three Sub-centers at Dhenkanal, Cuttack and Bhubaneswar.

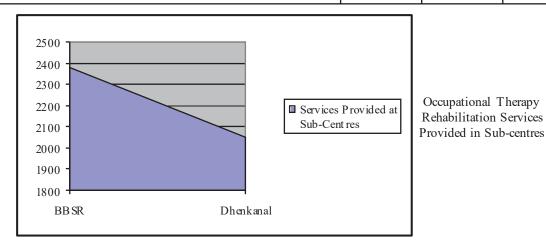

#### 11.3 Library

#### 11.3.1 Central/ Medical/ Technical Library :

The Institute's central/Medical/Technical Library has a collection of 8,393 latest books 8,458 journals and several reports, reprints etc.52 new books are added for the year 2018-19. The Library is kept open for twelve hours (8.30 am to 9.00 pm) excluding 30 minutes Lunch break, and caters to the information needs of staff and students of the Institute, Govt. functionaries, rehabilitation professionals of other centers, NGOs, persons with disabilities and their relatives.

#### **CHAPTER 12**

### ASSISTANCE TO DISABLED PERSONS (ADIP) SCHEME

#### 12.1 Introduction

It has been the constant endeavor of the Government to provide the disabled persons with aids/appliance, at minimum costs, which are essential for their social, economic and vocational rehabilitation. Census, 2011 states that there are 2.68 crore Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) in the country. In addition, about 3% of the children below 14 years of age suffer from delayed development. Many of them are mentally retarded and cerebral palsied and require aids/appliances to attain capacity for self-care and independent living, with the application of modern technology. A large number of disabled persons are from the lowincome groups and are deprived of the bene fits of these appliances because of their inability to find funds to acquire them and consequently of dignified independent living.

# 12.2 Objectives:

The main objective of the Scheme is to assist the needy disabled persons in procuring durable, sophisticated and scientifically manufacture d, modern, standard aids and appliances to promote physical, social, psychological rehabilitation of Persons with Disabilities by reducing the effects of disabilities and at the same time enhance their economic potential. Assistive devices are given to PwDs with an aim to improve their independent functioning, and to arrest the extent of disability and occurrence of secondary disability. The aids and appliances supplied under the Scheme must have due certification. The Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995 (PwD Act) and National Trust Act, 1999.

# 12.3 Eligibility of the beneficiaries:

A person with disabilities fulfilling following conditions would be eligible for assistance under ADIP Scheme.

- i. An Indian citizen of any age.
- ii. Holds a 40% Disablement Certificate.
- iii. Has monthly income from all sources not exceeding Rs. 20,000/- per month.
- iv. In case of dependents, the income of parents/guardians should not exceed Rs. 20,000/- per month.
- v. Who have not received assistance during the last 3 years for the same purpose from any source. However, for children below 12 years of age, this limit would be one year.

• Note: - Income certificate of beneficiaries staying in orphanages and half-way homes etc. may be accepted on certification of District Collector or Head of the organization concerned. Such beneficiaries will be provided aids & appliances under this Scheme by ALIMCO.

#### 12.4 Quantum of assistance to disabled:

For aids and appliance s costing up to Rs. 10,000/-.

Aids/appliances which do not cost more than Rs. 10,000/- are covered under the Scheme for single disability. However, in the case of SwDs, students beyond IX class, the limit would be raised to Rs.12,000/-

The amount of Assistance will be as follows:

• Travelling cost would be admissible separately to the PwDs and one escort limited to bus fare or railway, subject to a limit of Rs. 250/- each person, irrespective of number of visits to the centre.

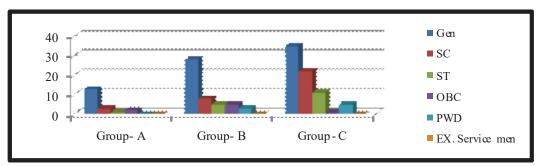

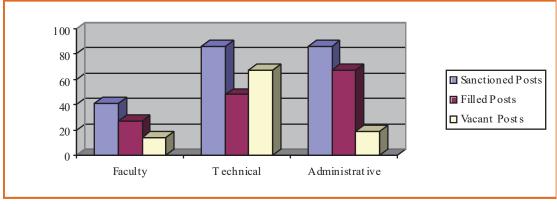

To cope up with this demand and for implementing Government policies and programmes in providing a comprehensive rehabilitation services, the Institute has been conducting five long term and eleven short term courses for the year 2018-19.

#### **15.3** Long-Term Courses: The details of the current courses are mentioned below:

#### 15.3.1 Degree Courses:

#### i. Bachelor of Physiotherapy (B.P.T.):

The Institute started Bachelor of Physiotherapy (B.P.T.) degree course in 1987. The present intake capacity is 62 students and it is of four and a half (4½) years duration (including six months Internship). This course is affiliated to Utkal University, Bhubaneswar. The minimum entry qualification for the course is passing in 10+2 examination in science stream or its equivalent with minimum 50% aggregate marks for general candidates and 40% for Scheduled Castes / Scheduled Tribes / Physically Handicapped candidates in subjects on Physics, Chemistry and Biology. Pass in English as one of the subjects is compulsory.

#### ii. Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (B.O.T.):

The Institute started Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (B.O.T.) degree course in 1987. The present intake capacity is 62 students and it is of four and a half (4½) years duration (including six months Internship). This course is affiliated to Utkal University, Bhubaneswar. The minimum entry qualification for the course is passing in 10+2 examination in science stream or its equivalent with minimum 50% aggregate marks for general candidates and 40% for Scheduled

Castes / Scheduled Tribes / Physically Handicapped candidates in subjects on Physics , Chemistry and Biology. Pass in English as one of the subjects is compulsory.

#### ii. Bachelor of Prosthetics and Orthotics (B.P.O.):

As part of ALIMCO, Institute started with conducting Certificate Courses in Prosthetics and Orthotics in 1976-77. The Institute conducts degree course in Bachelor of Prosthetics and Orthotics, since 1999 initially of 3½ years duration (including six months Internship) which was later converted to (4½) years degree course (including six months Internship) in 2003. The course is affiliated to Utkal University, Bhuba neswar. The minimum eligibility for admission is 10+2 examination in Science or its equivalent with Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics or Biology with a minimum score of 50% for General category and 40% for SC/ST/PH candidates. Pass in English as one of the subjects is compulsory. The intake capacity is 46 seats.

#### iii. Selection Procedure:

All India Common Entrance Test (CET) for selecting the candidates for all these three courses for SVNIRTAR and National Institute for Locomotor Disabilities (NILD), Kolkata and NIEPMED, Chennaiis being conducted by (NILD), Kolkata on 17th June 2018 in collaboration with SVNIRTAR. 169 new students joined these courses. Seats were reserved as per the Govt. of India reservation policy/norms.

#### **15.3.2 Postgraduate Courses:**

#### i. Masters of Occupational Therapy (MOT):

Postgraduate Degree course in Occupational Therapy (MOT) of two years duration, with an intake capacity of 15 seats is continuing at the Institute. The course is affiliated to Utkal University, Bhubaneswar. The specializations available are 'Rehabilitation', 'Developmental Disabilities', 'Hand Rehabilitation' and 'Neurology'

#### ii. Masters of Physiotherapy (MPT):

Postgraduate Degree course in Physiotherapy (MPT) of two years duration, with an intake capacity of 15 seats is continuing at the Institute. The course is affiliated to Utkal University, Bhubaneswar. The specializations available are 'Rehabilitation', 'Musculoskeletal Conditions', 'Neurology' and 'Pediatric'.

#### iii. Masters of Prosthetics and Orthotics (MPO):

Postgraduate Degree course in Prosthetics & Orthotics (MPO) of two years duration, with an intake capacity of 10 seats is continuing at the Institute from 2016-17 Academic sessions. The course is recognized by Rehabilitation Council of India, (RCI) and affiliated to Utkal University, Bhubaneswar.

# iv. DNB PMR:02 DNB(PMR) students admitted for the year 2017-2018. v. Selection Procedure:

Forty students were selected for MPT, MOT & MPO courses through the PG Entrance Examination conducted by the Institute. Counseling -cum-admission for MPT/MOT/MPO course through postgraduate entrance examination-2018 heldon 1st July 2018.39 new students joined for the above mentioned courses.

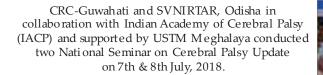

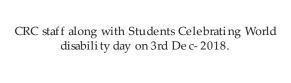

### CHAPTER 19 CSR Activities

### 19.1 Introduction

The construction work of the 100 bedded annex building to establish the Institute as a "Centre of Excellence for Deformity Correction" under Corporate Social Responsibility Scheme has been in full swing and the ground floor roof slab casting has been completed and the first floor roof slab is going to be casted soon.

### B. Installation of CAD/CAM system - Rs.2, 72, 65,190.00

Successful installation of CAD-CAM(Computer aided designing and Computer aided manufacturing) worth 2,72,65,190.00 in the department of prosthetics and orthotics for imparting high end technology education towards both graduate and postgraduate students for production of accurate and precision prosthetics and orthotics sockets. This system is extended by the National Aluminum Company Limited (NALCO), Bhubaneswar.

### 19.1.2 Upcoming CSR Projects:

### CHAPTER 20 Rights of Persons with Disabilities (RPWD) Act-2016

### 20.1 Introduction

This phenomenon of Disability (Divyang) is an indispensible part of the human experience and cannot be separated from the social milieu where it is produced. It cannot exist outside the periphery of social structure. Of course conceptions regarding disability have undergone changes from time to time, from place-to-place and from person to person. The collective struggle of people with Disabilities and the support of non-disabled friends, policymakers and professionals led to the passage of Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and full Participation) Act-in December 1995. Rights of Persons with Disabilities (RPWD- Act-2016 already replace the existing PwD Act-1995, which was enacted 21 years back.

### 20.1.1 Salient features of the Act:

- i. The types of Disability have been increased from existing 7 to 21 and the central Government will have the power to add more types of Disabilities.
- ii. The 21 Disabilities are:
  - 1. Blindness
  - 2. Low vision
  - 3. Leprosy cured persons
  - 4. Hearing impairment (deaf and hard of hearing)
  - 5. Locomotors Disability
  - 6. Dwarfism
  - 7. Intellectual Disability
  - 8. Me ntal illness
  - 9. Autism spectrum Disorder
  - 10. Cerebral Palsy
  - 11. Muscular Dystrophy
  - 12. Chronic Neurological conditions
  - 13. Specific Learning Disabilities

- 14. Multiple Sclerosis
- 15. Speech and Language Disability
- 16. Thalassemia
- 17. Hem ophilia
- 18. Sickle cell disease
- 19. Multiple Disabilities including deaf blindness
- 20. Acid Attack Victim
- 21. Parkinson's disease
- iii. Speech and Language Disability and Specific Learning Disability have been added for the first time. Acid Attack Victim have been included, Dwarfism, Muscular Dystrophy have been indicated as separate class of specified Disability. The new cate gories of Disabilities also included three Blood Disorders, Thalassemia, Hemophilia and Sickle cell disease.
- iv. In a ddition, the Government has been authorized to notify any other category of specified Disability.
- v. Responsibility has been cast upon the appropriate Governments to take effective measures to ensure that the PwD enjoy their rights equally with others.
- vi. Additional benefits such as reservation in higher education, Government jobs, reservation in allocation of Land, poverty alleviation schemes etc. have been provided for persons with bench mark Disabilities and those With high support needs.
- vii. Every child with benchmark disability between the age group of 6 and 18 years shall have the right to free education.
- viii. Government fundededucational institutions as wellas the government recognized institutions will have to provide inclusive e ducation to the children with disabilities.
- ix. For strengthening the Prime Minister's Accessible India Campaign, stress has been given to ensure accessibility in public buildings (both Government and Private) in a prescribed time-frame.
- x. Reservation in vacancies in Government establishments has been increased from 3% to 4% for certain persons or class of persons with benchmark disability.
- xi. The Bill provides for grant of guardians hip by District Court under which there will be joint decision making between the guardian and the persons with disabilities.

- xii. Board based Central & State Advisory Boards on Disability are to be set up to serve as a pex policy making bodies at the central and state level.
- xiii. Office of Chief Commissioner of persons with Disabilities has been strengthened who will now be assisted by 2 Commissioners and an Advisory Committee comprising of not more than 11 members drawn from experts in various disabilities.
- xiv. Similarly, the office of State Commissioners of Disabilities has been strengthened who will be assisted by an Advisory Committee comprising of not more 5 members drawn from experts in various disabilities.
- xv. The Chief Commissioner for persons with Disabilities and the state Commissioners will act as regulating bodies & Grievance Redressal agencies and also monitor implementation of the Act
- xvi. District level committees will be constituted by the State Governments to address local concerns of PwDs details of their constitution and the functions of such committees would be prescribed by the State Governments in the rules.
- xvii. Creation of National and State Fund will be created to provide financial support to the persons with disabilities. The existing National fund for persons with Disabilities and the Trust fund for Empowerment of persons with disabilities will be subsumed with the National Fund.
- xviii. The Bill provides for penalties for offences committed against persons with disabilities and also violation of the provisions of the newlaw.
- xix. Special Courts will be designated in each district to handle cases concerning violation of rights of PwDs. The New Act will bring our law in line with the United National Convention on the Rights of persons with disabilities (UNCRPD), to which India is a signatory. This will fulfill the obligations on the part of India in terms of UNCRD. Further the newlaw will not only enhance the Rights and Entitlements of Divyangjan but also provide effective mechanism for ensuring their empowerment and true inclusion into the Society in a satisfactory manner.

We have sudited the attached Balance Sheet of Swami Vivokumand (National Institute of Rehabilitation and Research, Olatpur, Cuttack (SVNIRTAR) as on 31" March, 2019 and the lacome & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 20(1) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted—for the period up to 2018-19. These financial statements include the accounts of two Composite Regional Centres (CRCs) of SVNIRTAR. These financial statements are the responsibility of the management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, ere. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any are reported through hispection (Seports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assumes about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

### Revision of Accounts

The SVNIRTAR revised its accounts for the year 2018-19 based on the audit comments. The net impact of audit comments given in below paragraphs is overstatement of Assets by Rs.59.67 lakh. However, on revision of accounts by the Institute, the overstatement of Assets has been rectified.

### A. General

- A.1 The expanditure-cum-utilization certificates (CPWA form-65) of seven completed/anguing works (during 2018-19) as detailed below were not obtained from CPWD and not provided to Audit. The expanditure statement should be obtained and expanditure and advance given should be reconciled with accounts.
- A.2 No provision for retirement benefits has been made in the accounts in contravention of Accounting Standard 15 issued by ICAJ.

### B. Grants -in -Aid

Our of GIA of Rs.4754.16lakh received during the year together with interest of Rs. 11.36 lakh and unutilized balance of Rs184.40 lakh pertaining to previous year, the Institute utilized a sum of Rs. 4265.28 lakh during 2018-19 leaving a balance of Rs.744.64 lakh as on 31.3.2019.

C. Management Letters-Deficiencies which have not been included in the Separate Audit Report have been brought to the notice of SVNIRTAR. Obsert, Cuttack through a management letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.
